From Superintendent, Aaron Johnson

It is easy to miss the inconspicuous brass plaque resting atop a brick pillar by the flagpole in front of Listwood. It reads: *Buildings Speak ... They say to students that you and your future are important. We must listen.* Dr. Glenn Wachter.

In what continues to be a rapidly changing world, the wisdom of former West Irondequoit CSD Superintendent, Dr. Wachter, couldn't be more evident. Students and our schools are the future and the lifeblood of our community.

As the Board of Education and district embarked on developing the 2023-24 budget plan, they were guided by this goal: Create a safe, comprehensive and robust educational experience in which every child finds comfort and a place where their unique talents and personality are valued. Thanks to the support of our community and a highly skilled and dedicated staff, our students deliver year after year on that promise. Education, and youth, are West Irondequoit's prime investments, and it shows.

Being fiscally sound and financially responsible is a core commitment at the heart of the budget planning process. With rising inflation and the stress of local reassessments, maintaining this commitment continues to be of primary importance. Again, this year's budget plan falls within the state's tax cap calculation, helping us maintain a 12-year average tax levy increase of 2.15%, and our per pupil spending remains second-lowest in Monroe County (16th out of 17 districts). Statistics like this make our district one of the

top values in the area and, as we know, a desired community to raise a family.

This is the final year of New York State's commitment to fully fund foundation aide, the largest portion of NYS school aid. This is important to know because after this year it has been forecasted that schools will receive limited state aid increases for the foreseeable future. This point was a key consideration in our budget development. As a result, we were cautious in adding and including additional reoccurring costs to the proposed budget.

Districts like ours must address fundamental concerns about school safety, learning loss, and growing social, emotional and mental health needs. In some years, we have been forced to make concessions that have impacted infrastructure, safety, support services, and our continuum of services because of the lack of state funding. As a best practice, we analyzed our programs, including instruction, operations, safety and security, and student services, over the past few years. We have begun restoring services to the levels needed by today's standards. This year has included reinstating the Director of Safety and Security, additional security and mental health support, expanding self-contained and

What if the district budget is not approved by voters?

A simple majority vote is required for the proposed budget to be approved, as the proposal meets the acceptable tax levy threshold for West Irondequoit with a 2.30% tax levy increase. The Board of Education could propose one more budget for voter approval, or it could elect to adopt a contingency budget. A contingency budget cannot contain a tax levy that is greater than the levy of the previous year. [»](#)

integrated classroom options at the elementary grades, and rethinking our support for instructional technology and our infrastructure.

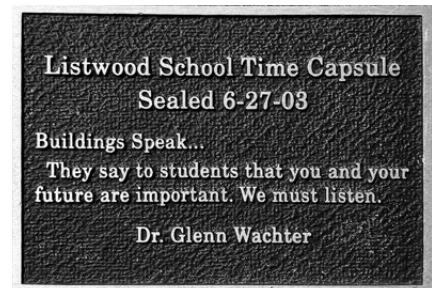
Also included on the May 16 ballot is a \$19 million Capital Project proposition addressing essential infrastructure, safety needs and program improvements. We call it the R.I.S.E Project (Reimagine-Inspire-Secure-Educate) and it's important to note that it will not increase your tax bill by a single cent. Please read more about it on the center insert of this newsletter or the district website, but some highlights include creating a second-story, enclosed bridge between Dake Junior High School and IHS and fortifying classroom doors. Both enhance safety. Replacing select aging rooftop HVAC units, upgrading Library Media Centers and adding age-appropriate middle school playgrounds are also part of the R.I.S.E. Project.

Our buildings have spoken. They need attention and the R.I.S.E. Project will begin to address that and more.

Every year offers a chance to recognize our children's importance in the future of our community, state and nation. Whether or not you're a household with school-aged children, today's youth are tomorrow's doctors, nurses, lawyers, technicians, scholars, scientists, musicians and more.

If Irondequoit is to fulfill its motto of being "a town for a lifetime," we must start by providing for our most precious asset, our children.

A Living History: Students learn from local veterans

On March 29th, more than 80 Irondequoit High School students spent more than two hours speaking in small groups in the IHS Media Center with 36 local veterans from different branches of the military. The first-of-its-kind IHS event was called, “A Living History,” by social studies teacher, Amanda Janas-Tramonto.

A few years ago on TV, she saw a similar event and contacted the California school about it. Her vision and hard work brought it to our district. “We are putting a face to the history that we talk about in class,” she said.

“It’s fun to talk (with students). It takes you back to when you were young,” said Navy veteran Donald J. Wilbert. “Nobody ever did this for us.”

Originally scheduled for March of 2020, the event was postponed due to COVID-19. Thankfully, Janas-Tramonto saved her copious notes and contact information. “I think this is a great opportunity, not only for myself and other veterans, but I think it’s a great opportunity for the kids,” said local Vietnam veteran, Mr. Patrick Hoover.

2023-24 Budget Objectives

Development of the 2023-24 budget centered on the following objectives:

- Balance enrollment changes at grade levels to maintain class sizes
- Continue to follow Special Education mandates
- Align our curriculum and instruction resources as stated in the Strategic Plan
- Restore elements of the budget that had been reduced in the past
- Maintain a sustainable 5-Year Financial Plan while staying within the Tax Levy Cap.

The continued restoration of Foundation Aid and its promise to provide a predictable and sustained revenue source for the District has allowed for the right sizing of budget elements and meeting targeted staffing objectives identified in our department functional

reviews. For Instructional Technology, the 2023-24 budget includes a Senior Network Technician. The inclusion of this important position will enhance the cyber security of our networks and maintain a high level of satisfaction with our 1:1 computer initiative. The budget also includes funds for the addition of up to three special educators for our ICT program at 7-12 to meet student needs and ensure compliance with special education mandates.

The budget also includes \$100,000 for a Capital Outlay Exclusion Project (COEP) to make improvements at Seneca elementary school. The proposed project will address classroom and corridor doors to improve lockdowns without compromising fire egress routes. There also will be flooring replacement and associated asbestos abatement. We anticipate receiving more than \$80,000 in state aid on this project, for the following budget year. 📄

The first leg in that plan is the R-I-S-E Project that is being proposed on May 16.

This project will accomplish much-needed renovations in our schools with **NO ADDITIONAL TAX IMPACT** on District residents and businesses. That is the result of smart planning, fiscal responsibility, and leveraging our capital reserves and available state building aid to fully fund the project.

The R-I-S-E Project will make dramatic improvements to areas of need in our District. It will revolutionize outdated Library Media Centers, bringing us up to speed with other schools. It will enhance safety and security in a variety of ways and help us make necessary upgrades to facilities and systems that need it. 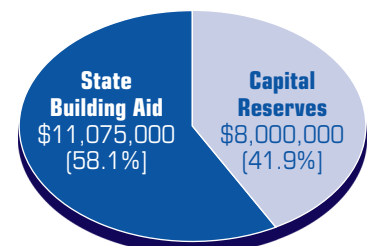

Project Financing

The total referendum amount for the scope of work that is being proposed in the R-I-S-E Project is \$19,075,000. Due to careful project planning and consideration of our taxpayers, the proposed project's financing plan would be tax neutral, resulting in **no additional tax impact** on District residents and businesses. The proposed project will be paid for using a combination of available State Building Aid and \$8,000,000 from the District's capital reserves, which are designated to be used specifically for capital improvements.

Project Highlights

Bridge Connector/Walkway

An enclosed walkway bridge connecting Irondequoit High School to Dake Junior High School was initially planned to be included in our 2003 Capital Improvement Project. It was tabled due to funding limitations, and we are now able to revisit and accomplish this need. An enclosed, second-story walkway will improve safety and security so students will no longer need to exit and re-enter to change buildings.

Playgrounds at Rogers and Iroquois

Our six K-3 playgrounds were replaced as part of our last Capital Project in 2018. The R-I-S-E Project will allow for new, age-appropriate playgrounds to be provided for grades 4-6.

Library & Media Center Upgrades

The library and media center areas at Rogers-Southlawn and Iroquois schools will be re-imagined and renovated to provide Makerspaces and support our growing STEAM programs. In addition to reconfiguring and redesigning these program spaces, they will also be outfitted with more innovative and modernized learning tools and resources to complement our book collections.

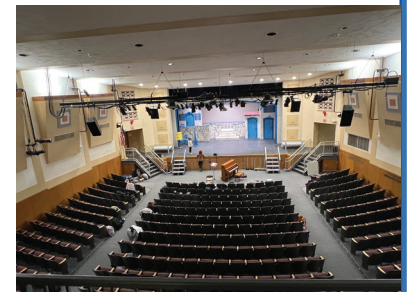
School Library Renovations

Additional School Building Improvements

- Replacement of aging HVAC rooftop units at IHS, Dake and Rogers-Southlawn will improve classroom ventilation and temperature control.
- Various interior door/frame/hardware replacements at Dake and Iroquois will improve safety and security.
- Ground floor bathroom renovations at Iroquois will improve health safety and accessibility.
- Installation of security window film in various academic buildings will enhance building security.
- New lighting and rigging at the Irondequoit High School Auditorium will allow our actors, musicians, and other performers to shine even brighter.

D.O.E.S. Building Relocation & Renovation

The District's Department of Environmental Services (D.O.E.S.) building on Washington Avenue is outdated and unsuitable for our current needs. The former Lakeview Elementary property at 330 Pattonwood Drive, which is owned by the District, would become its new and permanent location. The new location will provide ample space for vehicle maintenance/repairs and storage needs. It will also enable our D.O.E.S. staff, who are crucial to maintaining our buildings and grounds, to be housed together in one building rather than across the District.

Ursula Nicholson, the Director of Employment Services for Starbridge, the agency that placed Lane with West Irondequoit, says some employers grossly underestimate people with disabilities, but the tightening of the labor market is starting to change that mindset. “They’re coming in with that new energy, that passion of ‘Finally, someone sees me and I want to be here,’” Nicholson said.

That’s Lane, who credits her parents for teaching her about having a strong work ethic. Lane says she hopes people who read about her will learn acceptance of people with disabilities. “We are people; we have feelings,” Lane said. “We’re human beings and we should not be, like, pushed aside.”

DECA Students Enhance Safety on Cooper Road

Advocacy secured speed-tracking sign in front of schools

Irondequoit High School business students in its DECA Club won their usual large allotment of awards this school year and seven were scheduled to participate at the national competition in Orlando in late April. But two DECA students were the driving force behind a project that will have a long-lasting impact on our school and community.

As part of their annual “Advocacy Campaign,” seniors Isabella Falcone and Cameron Murray emailed a video to Town Supervisor Rory Fitzpatrick detailing the need for a digital speed-tracking sign in front of IHS and Dake Junior High School on Cooper Road. It fulfilled the “Public Policy” component of their multi-layered campaign, but it also will make for a safer street. After seeing the video, Fitzpatrick requested a meeting with the students and told them the town secured funding for the sign. It went up this spring.

“It is always great to meet with students who are well informed on a topic that is important to them when they can provide factual evidence to back up their claims,” Fitzpatrick noted in a letter praising Falcone and Murray.

“Hats off to Isabella, Cameron and our whole DECA family at large on another big success. Pedestrian safety on Cooper Road is always on our mind and securing this added resource in partnership with

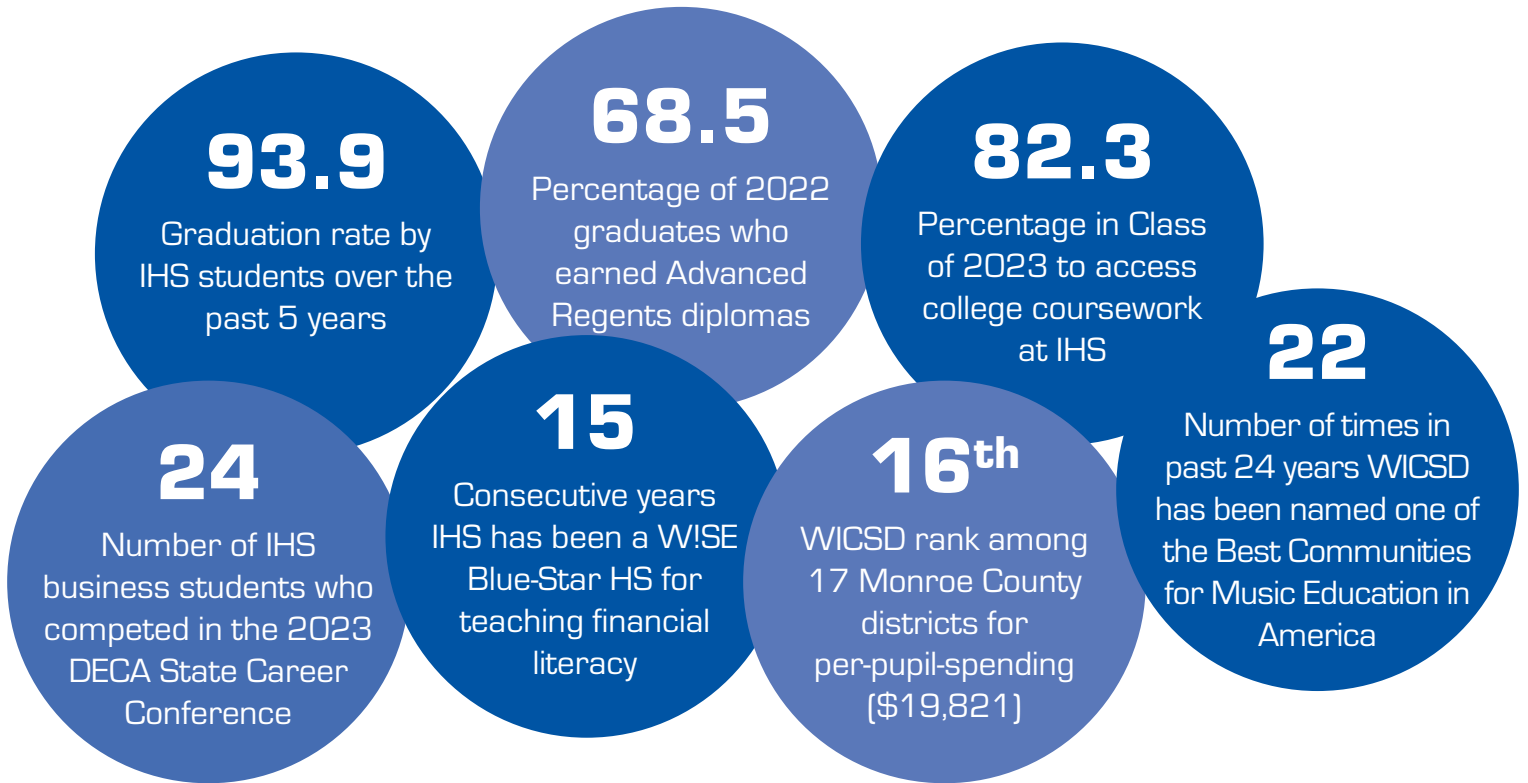

WI sending two teams to Odyssey of the Mind 'Worlds'

For the first time in nine years, West Irondequoit is sending a team to the Odyssey of the Mind World Finals. In fact, we are sending two groups – both from Iroquois Middle School – and having multiple teams earn a spot hasn't happened since 2009! They will compete May 25-27 in East Lansing, Mich., on the campus of Michigan State University with traditionally more than 600 teams from around the globe and about 30,000 fans in the stands.

"It has been our privilege working with such talented students and dedicated parent volunteers (as coaches)," said Mary Beth Lenzi, who shares the title of West Irondequoit CSD Odyssey of the Mind Coordinator with her husband, Patrick.

"Over the years we have seen the profound and lasting impact this program has had on students, and we are so fortunate to have this program in our district. It builds confidence and independence because the students do all the work themselves," Mary Beth added. "This year we were blown away by the creativity and hard work of all the West Irondequoit teams. We are especially proud of these two Iroquois teams, and we are excited for the enriching experience they will have at World Finals."

Odyssey of the Mind (OM) is an international educational program for students in grades kindergarten through college (offered in our district for grades 4-12). It requires students to work collaboratively using creativity, ingenuity, quick-thinking and problem-solving skills. Those problems may range from building mechanical devices to presenting their own interpretation of literary classics. Across our district, 119 students participated in OM this school year under the guidance of 39 volunteer coaches. Teams advance through local competition, six earned a spot in the April 15th state competition in Syracuse and two are on to the Worlds! Both feature seven students.

One team, called "The Most Dramatic Problem Ever" is all sixth-graders. The other, called "Because iCan," is all fifth-graders.

Success takes months of working together, often a couple times a week. Teams choose from five problem categories: Vehicle, Technical, Classics, Structure and Performance. The fifth-graders chose Technical Performance and sixth-graders chose Performance. One of their competition tasks also includes being able to think and work through problems spontaneously.

"They learn how to work together, compromise and really listen to each other even when they don't always agree," Mary Beth Lenzi said. "these are skills for life."

Two West Irondequoit teams have been crowned World Champions and they happen to be the same seven students who won it all as Dake Junior High School eighth-graders in 2005 and then again as juniors in 2008. Their names: Keith Bull, Sarah D'Ambrosio, Matt Hoderlein, Laura Kieliszak, Allison Lenzi, Lindsay Taylor and Micah Wightman. Yes, Allison is Mary Beth and Patrick's daughter and is now a Lieutenant Commander in the United States Navy.

This year two Irondequoit High School seniors were awarded Odyssey of the Mind scholarships. Nora VanDerMeid received the 2023 Julie Ryan Memorial Scholarship from the Greater Rochester Regional Odyssey of the Mind Association and Lauren Lamberson received the 2023 New York State Odyssey of the Mind Association scholarship.

When asked what it took to get to Worlds, a few members of the 2023 teams said it took creativity, teamwork, strong friendship, determination and perseverance. "Never giving up," said sixth-grader Oliver Sherwood.

And, they said, it's fun. Good luck, teams! 🍀

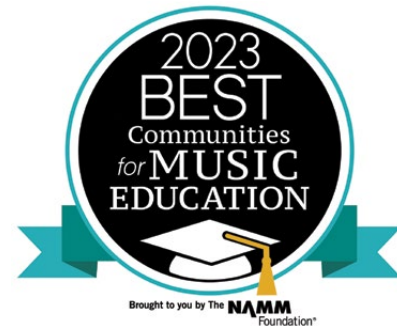
VOTER QUALIFICATIONS

You are eligible to vote if you are a U.S. citizen; you have lived in the West Irondequoit School District for at least 30 days prior to the vote; you are at least 18 years of age by the day of the vote.


The West Irondequoit Board of Education requires proof of residency at the polls. Examples include a driver's license or other documentation proving residence in West Irondequoit.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

West Irondequoit residents, who qualify, can vote on the annual budget and board election by absentee ballot. Residents unable to vote in person because of disabilities, illness, travel or other valid reasons listed under election law, may request an application for an absentee ballot in person weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. from District Clerk Jenna Lustig, District Office, 321 List Avenue, Rochester, NY 14617. The application is also available on the district website at www.westirondequoit.org. Completed applications must be received in the district clerk's office at least 7 days before the vote (May 9) if ballot is to be mailed, or by 4:30 p.m. the day prior to the vote (May 15) if ballot is to be delivered in person. Absentee ballots must be received by the district clerk no later than 5 p.m. on May 16.
